**Student Wellness Policy: A Student Wellness Policy was developed by members of the Student Health Advisory Council (SHAC) during the 2005-2006 school year. This policy addresses regulations and guidelines for nutrition and physical activity for student wellness. **Competitive Foods:** At no time during the school day can any foods be sold in competition with the school meal program. This includes vending machines, school stores, Relay for Life, student fundraisers, etc. The school day is defined as 12:01 a.m. until the last child is served lunch. This is a Federal Policy and will be enforced and monitored each school year.

**FINANCIAL:**

The Child Nutrition Program is a self-supporting enterprise business within the school system. As an enterprise system, Child Nutrition Operates as a business. Child Nutrition receives revenues from reduced and paid student meals and a la carte sales. The program is reimbursed a set amount per meal by the federal government (see rates below). Commodity foods are donated by the federal government to the Child Nutrition Program to be used in the preparation of meals. Child Nutrition uses the meal revenue and reimbursement to pay all of its expenses including but not limited to: food, supplies, and salaries.

**NUTRITION:**

The Child Nutrition Program strives to serve nutritious, delicious, and eye appealing meals to its customers. A variety of meal options are available in each cafeteria daily. In elementary schools, lunch choices include a minimum of three main entrees, three fruits/vegetables, two breads, and four milks daily. In middle and high schools, lunch choices include a minimum of four main entrees, three fruit/vegetables, two breads, and four milks daily. A variety of a la carte items are available for purchase as well.

Child Nutrition is working very hard to provide nutritious meals for its customers: the students, teachers, parents, and administration. Some ways in which the program strives to meet Nutrition Standards are by following the Nutrition Standards for Elementary Schools, My Pyramid, Dietary Guidelines for Americans and doing a nutritional analysis of all lunches served. The nutritional analysis software is called NutrKids. Child Nutrition also adheres to all required regulations and guidelines addressed in the Student Wellness Policy.

### **Nutrition Standards for Elementary Schools:**

Standards for school meals and a la carte snacks were approved by legislation during the 2006-2007 school year. Franklin County implemented these standards the first day of the 2007-2008 for all elementary schools.

In years to come, Nutrition Standards for Middle and High schools will be legislated.

### **NutriKids:**

NutriKids is a software program that is approved by the USDA that is used to analyze all school lunches. Lunches are analyzed for Calories, Protein, Vitamin A, Vitamin C, Iron, and Calcium.

New for 2011-2012: Look for carb. Counts to be published in all school cafeterias in addition to the monthly menu.

### **EDUCATION:**

Child Nutrition Managers are required to do a minimum of six Nutrition Education lessons in the classroom per year. Nutrition Education aims to teach students the importance of healthy eating and exercise. The Child Nutrition Training Manager assists the School Managers with this. Child Nutrition works very closely with community partners to educate our students on nutrition and healthy lifestyles. Two of our community partners are: Franklin County Health Department and Franklin County Cooperative Extension.

### **FOOD SAFETY:**

Child Nutrition implemented the Hazardous Analysis Critical Control Point (HACCP) program during the 2006-2007 school year. HACCP is a program that is mandated by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction (NCDPI) Child Nutrition Section. Process HACCP will follow the safety of foods from the time they are received from the delivery truck to the time they are served on the line.

Taking food temperatures is a daily responsibility of Child Nutrition staff and detailed temperature charts are maintained as well as daily, weekly and monthly safety and sanitation reports.

### **ALLIANCE FOR A HEALTHIER GENERATION:**

The Child Nutrition Program began participation with the Alliance for a Healthier Generation in 2008. The Alliance recognizes schools that are going the extra effort in offering nutritious meals, physical activity and promoting overall healthy lifestyles to students. Staff Wellness is always recognized by the Alliance. In 2008, Long Mill Elementary was recognized as meeting Bronze. In 2009, Bunn Elementary and Franklinton Elementary meet Bronze and Long Mill Elementary

meet Silver. In 2010, Bunn Middle meet Bronze and Bunn Elementary and Franklinton Elementary meet Silver. We look forward to continuing to work with these schools and more to grow healthy kids!

**USDA BEST PRACTICE AWARDS:**

The USDA Best Practice Awards recognize schools that are going above and beyond in certain areas and is given by the Southeast Regional Office of USDA. In 2009, Long Mill Elementary was recognized as Promoting a Healthier School Environment. In 2010, Bunn Elementary was recognized in the same category.

**FRESH FRUIT AND VEGETABLE GRANT:**

The Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Grant Program is a federally awarded grant program. Schools are given the opportunity to apply for this program and schools are chosen based on need and application. In 2010-2011, Franklinton Elementary and Laurel Mill Elementary were recipients of this grant and offered an extra fresh fruit or vegetable to their students a minimum of three times per week. Award schools for 2011-2010 are Franklinton Elementary, Laurel Mill Elementary and Louisburg Elementary.
